Parish Council News

So what does the Parish Council do?

We have new residents in our delightful village and perhaps it would be nice to give them a little background information about the Community Building and Parish Council?

The Parish Council owns the 'Community Centre', housing the Village Hall and The Breckland Club, the land on which the building stands, the greens and various scattered bits of land across the village. The Parish Council also owns several of the internal village roads and a number of trees.

Your Parish Council consists of six Councillors and a Parish Clerk. The quorum to make legal decisions is three or one third, whichever is more. No less than four meetings can be held per annum and this includes the Annual General Meeting.

The Parish Council bears no costs of running and maintaining this centre. Its resources are mainly in the form of the precept. This is an amount of money from the County Council, which is sourced from our Council Tax contributions. The current precept stands at £4,650 and this has to cover Parish Council expenditure such as Public Liability & Fidelity Insurance, membership to Council organisations,

annual audit, Parish Clerk's salary, and the upkeep (to the best of its financial ability) of the trees and roads owned by the Parish Council.

The Village Hall & the Breckland Club



These two totally separate entities are both tenants of the Parish Council, and are individually responsible for the upkeep of their tenanted premises both inside and out.

A number of activities take place in the Village Hall. It is available for hire for private functions weddings, wakes and parties. On most Tuesday's between 8–9 pm there is a Pilates Class, every first Sunday of the month between March and October there is a Car Boot with indoor café and occasionally we do run other hall events, such as talks, summer and New Year dances and Christmas Bazaars, advertised throughout the village as and when.

The Village Hall is run on a voluntary basis and new volunteers are always welcome — no regimental commitment, just when you can.

The Breckland Club is membership based and is cheap and easy to join. *Mick Mackender, Chairman* of the Parish Council; Sylvia East, Clerk to the Parish Council

Village News

Village Trees owned by the Parish Council

Most residents will be aware of the problems we have had with the Norway Maple down Marks Lane. Limbs broke off just shortly after some walkers had passed by! The Forestry Commission reacted quickly and the offending limbs were removed, only for them to realise that this tree is the responsibility of the Parish Council.

Following on from this, and in consideration of adverse media attention elsewhere, the Parish Council made a decision to have a full survey of the trees it owns. This survey had to be undertaken by a professional company.

The Report is now to hand, but the Parish Council needs time to digest what this will mean by way of expenditure. Certainly the Norway Maple requires more remedial work, and there is also an Oak by the church that is in dire need of attention. There will be other work needed throughout the rest of the tree stock, and the Parish Council will need to make a decision as to which trees require a lot of work, just be a little 'haircut', or to simply be

monitored and dealt with over the next few years. We are sure everyone will recognise that we do

need to safeguard the trees, not only because of their beauty, but also because of the safety issues. You can generally see what lies directly under you, but not always what is falling down from above!

There will always be an issue of available funds for 'village' work, so we need to take a sensible approach as

to where best we can apply our resources. Overall the decision by the Parish Council is that we MUST deal with the immediate issues of the tree survey, carry out any urgent pothole work on the main village roads and thereafter consider what financial provisions might be required for any future needs.
